DIRECTOR NOTES:

2021 wasn't exactly like Groundhog Day for 2020, but at points, it may have felt like it! Despite new variants and resumed mask restrictions, vaccine and booster availability helped some patrons feel more comfortable about attending events and checking out items in person. We continued Curbside service for those with concerns.

In other great news, the Library Foundation and YMCA collaboratively raised \$7.5 million for the new facility, nearly hitting our \$7.8 million goal in just one year. A huge "thank you" to the fundraising tri-chairs and committees that are helping make this project a reality! The construction schedule is not yet finalized, so watch for more news.

Energy-performance work with JCI continued, resulting in more efficient lighting at both our locations, and much needed heating and air-conditioning updates at the Downtown Library. We also partnered with Public Works to replace and beautify the 4th Avenue sidewalk, drainage, and curbs. We're also looking forward to making interior and exterior improvements to all buildings in 2022, thanks to a successful 2021 grant application. The On the Road to Recovery: Transforming Library Spaces grant is from the Illinois State Library.

Another big project for 2021 was creating new strategic and literacy action plans, which will guide our work from 2022-2025!

Increase in-person visits over 2020





- Assisted 700 readers find their next great book through Weekly Reads Newsletters & the RIPL Adult Reading Blog
- Enabled 101 patrons to check out rare or hard-to-find books through WorldShare Interlibrary Loan service.
- Offered 81 in-house adult programs

ADAPT & PIVOT!

HYBRID, TAKE-HOME & OUTDOOR PROGRAMMING FILLS A NEED

With parents and schools taking precautions, the Youth Services Department reached out with literacy opportunities, kits and videos for learning and doing at home, and partnership programs. By Summer 2021, we offered some programming outside, and partnered with Library2Go on "Summer2Go" outdoor reading and activities at parks, day camps, and Skip-a-long Center in Rock Island. Events included:

- Girl Scout Day at Hauberg Center
- Summer Reading at Spring Forward sites
- Rock Island Academy and Thomas Jefferson Elementary events

After months of all-virtual and at-home programs, outdoor Tie-Dye was our first in-person family event. It was clear how thrilled these girls were to see each other after a long COVID absence.

The Hug-a-Book early-literacy series continued its 25th year with take-home kits supported by online content. Children's Staff continued as video stars, recording weekly storytimes, book talks. unboxing new books. and hosting a Hug-A-Book dance party via Facebook Live and the RIPL YouTube Channel. In late 2021, we cautiously resumed limited in-person storytimes,


This teen craft video resulted in 1.924 views (and counting) on our YouTube channel!


